Writing Activity 2: Narrative Project

You are to write a narrative (or story) on the topic: "Found"

Your story might be about finding a lost pet, hidden treasure, or new friends. It could be about finding the solution to a problem or finding an opportunity to do something different and exciting. Your story could be about how people in difficult situations find courage, help or understanding.

Below is the criteria you need to follow in order to achieve the BEST possible results. Remember, with effort and hard work, you CAN achieve great results. Highlight areas you believe you have incorporated or completed in order to track your results.

First Step – Plan:

Either print out the story map below, or make your own on a piece of paper to plan out your writing (on page 2)

Second Step – Write:

Once you have completed your plan, you are to do your **first draft. You will have time on Thursday and Friday to keep working on your writing.** On **Monday** you will have time to make adjustments and self edit using a checklist (or have an adult edit). On **Wednesday, May 13th** you will have time to make your final changes before finalizing your good copy and sending it to me.

Your story must be at least 5 pages double-spaced (2.5 pages single-spaced).
